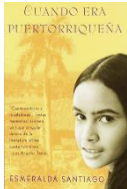

Art Institute of Chicago <http://www.artic.edu/aic/collections/> This website has downloadable images from their collections including some of their most famous paintings, *A Sunday on La Grande Jatte* by Georges Seurat, *American Gothic* by Grant Wood, *The Praying Jew* by Marc Chagall, and *Paris Street; Rainy Day* by Gustave Caillebotte.



Artcyclopedia <http://www.artcyclopedia.com> This website is a type of search engine. It has about 160,000 links to art work, art museum websites, art world news, and articles on art and artists.

New York Public Library Digital Collections <https://digitalcollections.nypl.org/> Explore 861,907 items digitized from The New York Public Library's collections. Materials include prints, posters, photographs, maps, manuscripts, streaming video, and more.

VADS (the Visual Arts Data Service) <http://www.vads.ac.uk> This website from the University for the Creative Arts in the UK has portfolio of visual art collections comprising over 140,000 images that are freely available and copyright cleared for use in learning, teaching, and research.

Printing Your Documents

Every computer in the Library sends their print job to “Academic Printer.” When you choose to print a document make sure that you select the correct printer. PaperCut is the program that controls all the printing on campus. PaperCut is supposed to be loaded automatically when the computer is turned on. If it is not loaded you will not get a dialog box telling you how much the printout will cost. If you don’t get the dialog box, ask a library faculty or staff member for help. Documents in Brightspace both PDF and Microsoft Office formats will sometimes need to be downloaded before printing. Scroll to the bottom of the document to see if there is a “Download” or “Print” button. Try the “Print” button. If that does not work, download the document and print using MS Word or Adobe Acrobat.

Study room J is the home for the ClearView magnification machine, that is a tool for people with low vision to be able to read books and printed documents. Students with low vision have priority for study room J. Bryn Horton, a low vision student, is a regular user. He told the librarian that he is very thankful for this machine as it enables him to read his assignments without the need of asking a person to be his reader. He is more expert at using this machine than anyone on the Library staff. If you have low vision and need help, sign out the room and use the ClearView machine.
