



Know Your Rights: What Is Title IX?

Title IX is a federal law that aims to prevent sexual assault and harassment on college campuses and ensures students certain basic rights.

What rights do I have under Title IX?

- I have the right to have an educational experience at City Colleges free of sexual assault, harassment, and stalking
- If I choose to file a complaint, I can request an internal discrimination and sexual harassment investigation
- I can request reasonable academic accommodations, such as a modified class schedule or campus safety plan after reporting

What are some examples of Title IX violations?

Regardless of gender or sexual orientation:

- Stalking by students, faculty, or staff
- Verbal or physical sexual harassment
- Sexual harassment or assault that occurs on campus grounds, including rape, abuse, and stalking
