## Transfer Leadership Class

The Transfer Leadership Class (TLC) starting in Summer 2020 was district-wide with the collaboration of other Transfer Center Directors in the City Colleges. Students from all seven City Colleges attended Summer 2020, Fall 2020, and Spring 2021 Sessions. During the Fall and Spring, we hosted two TLCs. In Summer and Fall 2020, the TLC was 6 weeks long, but starting in Spring 2021, the TLC was 4 weeks long. The class is designed to help Rockstars and high achievers to learn how to get into their dream schools all over the United States and to get full funding. Students also learn how to read their financial aid award (offer) letters, get to watch a Rockstar Alumni Panel, and learn about how to get scholarships, and write admissions and scholarship essays. 












### **HWC Rockstar Alumni Transfer Reunion**


T n 2018, I graduated summa cum laude ■ with an A.B. in Black Geographies from Mount Holyoke College as the first and only person in history to earn a degree in Black Geographies. After Mount Holyoke, I was admitted to geography departments at UCLA, the University of Kentucky, and UC Berkeley, and waitlisted in the African American Studies department at Yale. I am now a second-year Ph.D. student at UC Berkeley and the recipient of the Chancellor's Fellowship. Currently, I am preparing for my qualifying exams, and working with my colleague Robert Moeller to develop a theory and methodology that interrogates the methodological salience of scale as a Black feminist geographic practice that foregrounds the geographies of intersectionality. We are presenting our research at the American Association of Geographers conference in Seattle and our abstract has also been selected to appear as a refereed article in a special issue of the Professional Geographer. Additionally, I am presenting my research on the ways Black Twitter uses music to cultivate digital spaces of Black virtual care and sonic wellness during the corona virus pandemic at the Society of Ethnomusicology conference in Atlanta. I also serve as the graduate student rep for the Black Geographies Specialty Group and I am developing a Black Geographies method lab and library guides at UC Berkeley that is part of the Berkeley Black Geographies Project.

























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

















## Early Advice

#### 1. Apply Twice

Even if you don't feel ready, apply in your first year because schools really like to see it. It will also get you familiar with the process and make everything seem more doable when stakes are higher the second time around.

#### 2. Set Aside Money For Standardized Testing

Students just like you at top-tier universities commonly take the ACTs and/or SATs several times to get their best score. Don't let a lack of funds get in the way of performing as well as you know you can. Set aside, well in advance, the money you need to take your test of choice at least 2 or 3 times.

#### 3. Pay Close Attention to Transfer Requirements

Schools and programs list which courses you need to complete in order to transfer. Take these lists seriously and use them to choose your classes pretransfer/at CCC.

#### 4. Student Contributions and Self-Advocacy

At Cornell, the least amount of money you will have to pay even on a full ride is \$3,500.00. This is known as a student contribution and there is a set direct-from-the-school loan process to cover the cost (addressed by something called the Undergraduate Appeal Form) but you have to look/ask for it.

The universal rule here is, as I was advised by a Cornell employee, "advocate for yourself." Speak up and ask for help when you need it; people and universities want to help you but they need to know what you need. More often than not, many other people have asked the same and have made a path for you to take.

### 5. Consider Off-Campus Housing (If Your School Pays For It)

Weigh the potential benefits of dorm life (e.g. safety/security, community-specific events, dining halls, possible mentorship from faculty dorm staff) with those of off-campus living (e.g. freedom, privacy, larger and more personalized space).

At Cornell, the same amount is provided through financial aid for dorms or off-campus housing, and dorms are expensive. So if it costs \$1200.00 to live in a dorm, and you find an-off campus apartment for \$700.00, you get the remainder of the money-which could go toward your student contribution or a new wardrobe or whatever you want or need.

Sometimes the school owns but doesn't manage off-campus residences, which may provide some additional protection if you're apartment hunting non-locally.

You can also move into the dorms, take a look around, and then move off-campus, like I'm doing.

#### 6. Be Proactive About Changing Your Mind

University life asks students to make some important decisions pretty quickly. It may benefit you to make a habit of going into any such situation by determining how much time and leverage you have to change your mind. For example, when you start classes, mark the drop date and try to have backups (it can be good, for this reason, to over-enroll at the start and then pare down). If there is a fee for moving off-campus from the dorms after a certain date, make sure you know that date and/or the reasons that fee may be commonly waived. Be aware of similar in declaring your major or minor.

Universities expect students to shift gears, so help the guidelines they've set up in advance work for you--by knowing deadlines, any consequences for missing them, and processes of appeal.

#### 7. Be Nice

I used to study/work in the entertainment industry, and a golden rule I hope to always remember is be nice to everyone, especially the gatekeepers. When a secretary answers your call, keep in mind that they have the power to get you what you want and, as anyone who has worked in such a position knows, they are probably regularly disrespected, tired, etc. So be extra nice.

The same applies when you call or email anyone about admissions, financial aid, housing, or any such topics at your university of choice. Especially around the start of the semester, these workers are tired, they're probably being yelled at a lot by strangers. Be patient, considerate, grateful, and acknowledge how busy they must be, even or especially if you're feeling overwhelmed yourself.

Just a tiny extra effort from these people can do a lot for you. It's a good habit to cultivate for your future career. And generally, the world would be better if we all treated each other this way.

Also, use proper grammar, capitalization, and punctuation in emails to signal respect--especially to representatives of an academic institution.

#### 8. Train Your Resilience

An increasing amount of study is going into how people cultivate resilience (Angela Duckworth's book, Grit, is popular for conveying some of it well); this will be a useful tool in your application process and life so, if you haven't already, start developing it now. A few basic tools are things like conscious gratitude; getting enough sleep; getting enough water; connecting regularly with nature, even recorded nature sounds, setting aside time for friends and family; and connecting with some kind of spirituality or system of meaning-making.

Also narrative, describing your life in terms of an inspiring story. You may have to do it for your admissions essays so, once again, start now.

#### 9. Read for Pleasure

Get in the habit of reading things that aren't a part of your school curriculum. Let yourself be excited by ideas. Allow one book or thought lead you to another.

The more information you take in (off the Internet) regarding what interests you, the quicker you might arrive at knowing what you most or most specifically want to study when you transfer, what you most want to pursue in your professional life, and the more compellingly you can share that when you apply to your dream schools. Stanford actually asks for a list of books you've read in the year leading up to your application, and having a book to talk about will never fail you when you start developing a talent for networking—something you hopefully make time for while you're still in school.



### ROCKSTAR TRANSFER CHECKLIST

When you are ready to transfer...

- Apply to 10-15 schools (or more)! Apply to schools with different levels of selectivity or different transfer rates. You will learn how to do this at the Transfer 101 Workshop!
- If you have a Rockstar GPA (3.4 or higher), think about applying to some schools that provide full funding. Do not be discouraged by the price tag of a school. It is not how much the school costs; it is how much it costs YOU! Private schools can often afford to give discounts on tuition or additional merit-based scholarships.
- Apply to some schools where students from City Colleges of Chicago have received admission!
- Write your essays (especially the supplemental essays) based on your research of the school. For instance, if
  the supplemental essay on the Common App requires you to answer why you would like to transfer to your
  dream school, please make your answers specific to the school and not generic answers that could apply
  to any school. Spend time writing your essay. Show it to people you trust to edit it such as the Writing Lab,
  your favorite professors, or your advisor. Attend the Transfer Writing Workshop to edit your essays as well.
- If you are transferring in the fall semester, try to have all applications completed by Thanksgiving. Get them done early. It will allow you to have a great spring semester.
- Apply for the Jack Kent Cooke Undergraduate Transfer Scholarship if you have a 3.5 or higher GPA and have only taken classes at community college. This is a selective scholarship for community college students. Students can receive up to \$55,000 for two to three years. City Colleges had six winners in 2021. Find out who is the Jack Kent Cooke liaison on your campus, and work with them or speak with your Transfer Center Director for more information.
- Find out the financial aid deadlines for your schools and complete the College Scholarship Service (CSS) Profile, if necessary. The CSS Profile is important if your goal is to get full tuition scholarships to your dream schools. If eligible, complete the FAFSA application on October 1st each year for the following academic year or the Alternative Application for the Illinois RISE Act. Complete the CSS Profile by the financial aid deadline of your dream schools.
- Check out the PowerPoint by Diane Melville about Admission's Applications. It is on the HWCTransfer Center
  Brightspace site. There is a slide with sound files and slide #10 talks about a formula for writing Rockstar
  admissions and scholarship essays. Be sure to check out the sample essays on Brightspace.
- Speak with your Transfer Center Director before paying application fees! Ask if you are eligible for application fee waivers.
