

Going Back: Exploring Vietnam with a Veteran

Lance Corporal Robert P. Topping served in the United States Marine Corps from 1968-1970. After two tours in Vietnam, he finally returned to "the world" with a purple heart, a bronze star, and the difficulty of moving forward. In 2011, he went back to Vietnam in an effort to silence old ghosts. Prof. Cydney Topping was lucky enough to go with him, and their experience uncovers how deep the roots of war run, and how bloodlines do not dictate family. Come explore the majestic beauty of Vietnam, the incredible strength and compassion of its people, and a story of reconciliation.
